THE CHILD MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT ACT

WHAT IS THE CHILD MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT ACT?

- Also known as CMHTA, HB-1116, or SB-230
- Managed by the Colorado Department of Human Services,
 Office of Behavioral Health
- Helps pay for mental health treatment for at-risk children who cannot afford the care
- It's an alternative to having Social Services pay for the care when they don't need to be involved



- Any child between 0-18 who has a mental illness, is at-risk, and requires mental health care
- The child must be non-insured or underinsured (insurance will not cover needed treatment or only partially cover it)
 - Medicaid children: the Child Mental Health Treatment Act guarantees an assessment and decision for children seeking residential care



- The Child Mental Health Treatment Act has paid for:
 - Outpatient Therapy
 - o Family Therapy
 - o Intensive In-Home Therapy
 - Day Treatment
 - Equine Therapy
 - Psychiatry
 - Residential Treatment
 - Respite and Many Others
